Letchworth is the world's first Garden city and is an exemplar for new towns across the world. The tour will be guided by Josh Tidy, who is the curator of the international Garden Cities Exhibition Centre.

An untutored group activity, meeting in the city to sketch buildings, landmarks, museum exhibits, people etc. Arrive and say hello, then sketch – near to others in group, or more spread out – according to individual's preferences and the particular area. Afterwards, meet for a cuppa nearby to swap stories, admire drawings (optional...) and pool ideas about locations, materials used etc. (+ option to draw after lunch). I find sketching away from home more motivating and supportive when with others. This group would be for anyone who likes to draw, of whatever standard/experience. Drawing/painting materials need to be portable. (The art shop in King Street gives 10% discount to U3AC members). Wear weather appropriate clothes and bring drink. A lightweight portable stool might be useful. Jesus Green, plus lock (restored last year) avenues of trees, skatepark, Park Street cottages, Fort St George pub and boathouses. (Perhaps different bridges, exterior of Museum of Technology or Riverside/Equiano Bridge in the afternoon?)

Join a Cambridge City sculpture walk lasting approximately 90 minutes. We'll then walk to Pembroke College, visiting both the old and new sites, for works by Henry Moore, Nigel Hall, John Farnham and Antony Gormley. Heading to the city centre, we'll examine some of the familiar sculptures and art works, but also others that are less well known. The walk will finish at the New Museum site, where another Antony Gormley sculpture is among the various works on display. The walk will be led by Heather Warwick, one of the founder members of Cambridge Sculpture Trails together with Karina Plough.

Northstowe currently has around 4,000 inhabitants and is the biggest new town being built in the UK. When completed it will have around 10,000 houses and a population of about 25,000 people. The tour will be led by the Northstowe community development officers, and has been arranged by Ian Hunter, who is a U3AC tutor, and is also a Northstowe town councillor.

Buses from Cambridge are about every 10 or 15 minutes, and free parking is available at the Park and Ride, for those arriving by car.

## SE 12: A Celebration of Stone

The Celebration of Stone day will be opened by the Mayor of Cambridge at 12 noon and continue until 4 pm. It will feature tours of the magnificent monuments in the Cemetery, nature walks, demonstrations of stone carving and displays of the materials used in the gravestones. U3AC members are invited to an exclusive tour of the monuments by Michael French, the Cemetery's historian, focusing on the craftspeople who did the work. Histon Road Cemetery was established in 1843 by the Nonconformist community. It is Grade 2\* listed by Historic England as one of only three in England by the leading Victorian garden designer John Claudius Loudon. Loudon was the most influential horticultural journalist of his time and one of the first professional cemetery designers. Histon Road is the best surviving example of his work in this field, well known for its mature planting and calm beauty. The Cemetery lies between Histon Road and Victoria Road, about one mile north of Cambridge city centre. Gates from both these roads are joined by a wide path through the centre of the Cemetery. The Number 8 bus towards Histon stops near the Histon Road entrance, and from Histon near the Victoria Road entrance. The nearest parking is in Castle Park: on Sundays this costs £4.50 for the whole day.

Rosalind Grooms, Cambridge University Press archivist, Heidi Mulvey, Head of Community Engagement, and Gillian Cooke, Cambridge Assessment Group Archivist will provide an introduction to Cambridge University Press & Assessment and a tour of the highlights of the Press Museum and Assessment Archive. The fascinating museum displays explore the printing and publishing history of the Press from its beginnings in 1534 to the present day. The Assessment Archive in the nearby Triangle building holds content relating to public examinations which have been closely associated with education and the educational aspirations of societies since the mid nineteenth century.

**Meet:** University Printing House Reception (on entering the Press site, you will pass The Triangle building on your left. The Printing House is further on, beyond the grassed area on the right). The U bus stops in Brooklands Avenue by the junction to Shaftesbury Road, and a number of Stagecoach buses stop at Cambridge station, from which the Press is a ten-minute walk. Very limited visitor parking, which must be booked in advance on registering, giving make of vehicle plus registration number so that a named place can be allocated.

Founded by David Kindersley in 1946 and now run by his widow, Lida Lopes Cardozo MBE Litt.D. and daughter-in-law Roxanne, The Cardozo Kindersley Workshop applies the knowledge and traditions of a craft thousands of years old to bring beautiful things to life in the modern day. They create outstanding lettering in stone, glass, metal, wood and on paper – including headstones, commemorative plaques, heraldic carving, sundials, bookplates, typefaces and lettering cut straight into buildings. They cut with hammer and chisel and avoid using machines, designing, cutting, painting and gilding all entirely by hand.
